



Emil T Smolek

July 26, 1919 - November 25, 2019

Emil T. Smolek, born 100 years ago, to Bessie and Ben Smolek on the edge of Blue Sea Community. He was preceded in death by his brother Ed and sisters Mildred and Blanche. He was an ornery and intelligent child. He climbed the windmill at age three. Convinced his brother to hunt bear (raccoon) with the handle of a broom, and even managed to blow up the outhouse all before the age of ten. He attended a one room schoolhouse at the edge of the property where he was hired as caretaker at age eight, stoking the fire in the morning before class. At age 10 Emil lost his father to a car accident. He graduated from North Judson High School by the age of sixteen and made his way to South Bend to help his mother at the deli and store where she baked pies. His boss liked him, moving him up the ladder, even introducing him to his daughter, but Emil had different ambitions.

Because of his mother's cunning the family was able to keep the Family Farm through the great depression. He borrowed a team of horses and a tractor from the neighbor and walked in the echo of his father's footsteps. Surely his father's too early departure drove him to both succeed and to keep alive Ben's memory. In that first year, he would work into the night to near exhaustion, curl up under the machinery, and get up the next morning to do it again. It was in those first few years that he met Lauraine Paulsen. They were married in spring of '44.

His childhood dream to be a pilot was realized during WW II. He was a proud Army Air Corp Captain and Pilot of a B-24 bomber. If you've been around him,

you know there are thousands of stories from these years. The proudest of these is that he didn't lose one crewman. After the war he returned to his farm and wife, putting away dreams of aeronautical engineering at her request. After the war he took an agricultural short course from Purdue Extension, and he never stopped reading and learning. His curiosity may be one of his greatest attributes. Civic pride was a hallmark of the Great Generation. He was no exception, being a lifelong member of Lions Club, a stalwart of the St. Luke UCC church, and pillar of the community. He and his wife Lauraine bore a son, Don, and later added two, Randy and Marianne, making their family complete. He started with 200 acres, raised hogs until they tore up Lauraine's lawn. He raised dairy cows for milk, and laying hens for eggs. The farm produced corn, soybeans, wheat, rye, oats, peppermint and spearmint. Emil would get up at 3:00 am to start the silage chopper harvesting peppermint in July with a number of Blue Sea neighbors and relatives that worked together to distill the crop. He was innovative in his farming, raising yields and buying land. He started one of the first controlled corn yield test plots in the 1950's that they still plant today. While milking the cows Emil used to tell stories to Don about Indians from the Blue Sea area that rivaled the Zane Gray novels. Each Christmas he took the family to Florida to see his mom, brother Ed, and sister Blanche.

Emil was instrumental in working with then State Senator Birch Bayh to annex part of Cass Twp. in Pulaski County into the San Pierre and North Judson School district. He gave his old farm house to a cousin and they moved it 5 miles to its current site. In its place, he personally built his new home in 1964, including design, laying cement block and brick, wiring, plumbing and carpentry, and later repeated the process for several others in the area. He welcomed Don and Randy into the Family Farm in the 70's. His wife of 40 years and many travel adventures died at the age of 59. He spent many years the bachelor, but was lucky in love again. He and Dorothy Gunlach were married for 23 years. He always would say, "The person you choose as a spouse is the most important decision you will ever make." Grandchildren and

Great Grandchildren inevitably came along. There is even a little Emil, "Heaven help us!" Until the very end, Emil oversaw the Smolek Farm's accounting, helping with management decisions. He was still running the combine during harvest at age 97. Randy, grandson Kevin and Kevin's wife Luella Smolek farm the approximately 1,500 acres today. Though there is much more than this, suffice it so say, his was a life full and truly well lived.
